A MOVING EXPERIENCE

Over the past 12 years Cabrini Clinic has increased everything from the number of patients it serves and the hours it is open to the services it provides and the volunteers, students, staff and equipment it has to meet those needs. The one thing that has not changed is the size of the clinic where we serve our patients. We still occupy the same 2,000 square feet we have since Cabrini Clinic moved into the “new school” in the early 50’s.

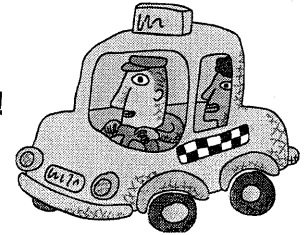
We have “made do” for all these years, but we are bursting at the seams and it is limiting the services we can provide. In addition to stepping over each other to get our jobs done, Kathleen McBride, principal of Most Holy Trinity School has said she would like to expand school programs, and we occupy space she would like to move into.



So it is time to look for a new home. The Convent Center, immediately south of the school, is vacant and Fr. Russ Kohler, pastor of Most Holy Trinity church is looking for a ministerial use for the space. Moving Cabrini Clinic into the Convent Center could answer all three of those needs.

The convent has 4,000 square feet of space on the first floor, a partial basement and a second floor. Small bedrooms down the main hall have sinks, making them idea to use for patient exam rooms. Staff from Oakwood Health System’s Ambulatory Division are working with clinic staff to design a

WE GOT WHEELS!



Getting our patients to specialty physician referral appointments has always been difficult. Our patients live in the city and generally don’t have their own transportation. The doctors who accept our referrals generally have their offices in the suburbs. Bringing the two together has been a challenge—but not anymore!

Cabrini Clinic Board member Nancy Wanchik took on this challenge. As Chief Operating Officer of Molina Healthcare of Michigan, Nancy was aware of medical transportation companies providing non-emergency transportation for patients. She contacted Medical Transportation Management, Inc. (MTM), headquartered in Lake St. Louis, Missouri, and asked them to drive a limited number of our patients each month to and from doctor appointments.

This service has already paid off for one Cabrini patient. This person had skin lesions and was referred to a dermatologist for an assessment. The patient had no transportation, no income and limited English skills. MTM picked up the patient and took him to a dermatologist in Clawson. It turned out the lesions were cancerous and without the services of MTM he would not have received that diagnosis and life-saving treatment.

Cabrini Clinic and our patients are blessed with this new partnership with Medical Transportation Management.
